SECTION A**Answer Question 01.****SOURCE A**

From a speech by Lloyd George at Limehouse, in the east end of London, 30 July 1909. This was one of a series of speeches made by Lloyd George country-wide.

It is rather a shame for a rich country like ours, probably the richest in the world, to allow those who have toiled all their days, to end in poverty and possibly starvation. It is rather hard that an old workman should have to find his way to the gates of the tomb, bleeding and footsore, through the brambles and thorns of poverty. We cut a new path for him, an easier one, a pleasanter one, through fields of waving corn. There are so many in the country blessed with great wealth, and if there are amongst them men who grudge from their riches a fair contribution towards the less fortunate of their fellow-countrymen, they are very selfish rich men.

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SOURCE B

From a speech by Lord Saltoun, made during a debate in the House of Lords in November 1909.

My Lords, this is without doubt a socialistic budget. I believe that it is brought in not so much with a view to obtaining the finance of the year, as with the aim of creating a quarrel with your Lordships' House. Members of the Government have been about London and other parts of the country appealing to the passions of some of the lowest classes. What can you expect? We all know that there is a section in society always ready, owing to poverty, crime and other evils, to assist in disorder, especially when invited to do so by those who hold office in His Majesty's Government. I think those who have appealed to such measures must be responsible for anything that takes place.

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With reference to these sources and your understanding of the historical context, which of these two sources is more valuable in explaining Lloyd George's People's Budget of 1909? [25 marks]
