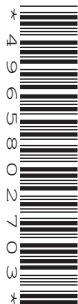

General information about practical exams

Centres must follow the guidance on science practical exams given in the *Cambridge Handbook*.

Safety

Supervisors must follow national and local regulations relating to safety and first aid.

Only those procedures described in the question paper should be attempted.

Supervisors must inform candidates that materials and apparatus used in the exam should be treated with caution. Suitable eye protection should be used where necessary.

The following hazard codes are used in these confidential instructions, where relevant:

Hazard data sheets relating to substances used in this exam should be available from your chemical supplier.

Before the exam

- The packets containing the question papers must **not** be opened before the exam.
- It is assumed that standard school laboratory facilities, as indicated in the *Guide to Planning Practical Science*, will be available.
- Spare materials and apparatus for the tasks set must be available for candidates, if required.

During the exam

- It must be made clear to candidates at the start of the exam that they may request spare materials and apparatus for the tasks set.
- Where specified, the supervisor **must** perform the experiments and record the results as instructed. This must be done **out of sight** of the candidates, using the same materials and apparatus as the candidates.
- Any assistance provided to candidates must be recorded in the supervisor's report.
- If any materials or apparatus need to be replaced, for example, in the event of breakage or loss, this must be recorded in the supervisor's report.

After the exam

- The supervisor must complete a report for each practical session held and each laboratory used.
- Each packet of scripts returned to Cambridge International must contain the following items:
 - the scripts of the candidates specified on the bar code label provided
 - the supervisor's results relevant to these candidates
 - the supervisor's reports relevant to these candidates
 - seating plans for each practical session, referring to each candidate by candidate number
 - the attendance register.

Specific information for this practical exam

During the exam, the supervisor (NOT the invigilator) must do all the experiments and record the results on a spare copy of the question paper, clearly labelled “supervisor’s results”.

If chemicals are prepared in more than one batch, clearly labelled supervisor’s results must be provided for each batch. The candidates using each batch must be listed on the supervisor’s report.

Apparatus

The apparatus listed must be provided to each candidate.

- 1 × plastic cup (expanded polystyrene/foamed plastic) supported in a 250 cm³ beaker
- 1 × 25 cm³ measuring cylinder
- 1 × 25 cm³ pipette
- 1 × pipette filler
- 1 × 50 cm³ burette
- 1 × stand
- 1 × burette clamp
- 1 × funnel for filling burette
- 1 × thermometer, −10 °C to +110 °C at 1 °C intervals
- a supply of test-tubes
- 1 × test-tube rack
- 1 × test-tube holder
- 1 × stirring rod
- 1 × boiling tube
- 2 × teat/dropping pipettes
- 1 × wash bottle containing distilled water
- 1 × Bunsen burner
- 1 × heat-proof mat
- paper towels
- red and blue litmus papers or Universal Indicator paper
- wooden splints
- apparatus normally used in the centre in testing for carbon dioxide with limewater

Materials

The materials listed in the table must be provided to each candidate.

label	per candidate	identity	notes
[C] P	250 cm ³	1.25 mol/dm ³ sodium hydroxide	Dissolve 50 g sodium hydroxide, NaOH [C] , in each dm ³ of solution.
[MH] Q	150 cm ³	1.0 mol/dm ³ sulfuric acid	Cautiously pour 56 cm ³ of concentrated (98%) sulfuric acid [C] into 500 cm ³ of distilled water with continuous stirring. When cool, make the solution up to 1 dm ³ with distilled water.
Supervisors are asked to carry out a standard acid/base titration between solutions P and Q to ensure that the concentrations of the two solutions fall within the given range. It is essential that 25.0 cm ³ of P reacts with between 15.0 cm ³ and 16.0 cm ³ of Q .			
[F] R	1 piece	magnesium ribbon	1 piece of magnesium ribbon [F] about 2 cm in length.
[MH] S	10 cm ³	0.1 mol/dm ³ iron(III) chloride in 0.1 mol/dm ³ sodium chloride	Dissolve 27 g hydrated iron(III) chloride, FeCl ₃ ·6H ₂ O [MH] [C] , in 1 dm ³ aqueous sodium chloride containing 6 g/dm ³ NaCl.
dilute hydrochloric acid	5 cm ³	2.0 mol/dm ³ hydrochloric acid	Dilute 170 cm ³ of concentrated (35–37%) approximately 11 mol/dm ³ hydrochloric acid [C] [O] to 1 dm ³ .
[MH] aqueous hydrogen peroxide	5 cm ³	20 volume hydrogen peroxide solution	Dilute 200 cm ³ of concentrated ('100 volume') hydrogen peroxide [C] [O] to 1 dm ³ . Use a fresh supply of '100 volume' hydrogen peroxide [C] [O] .
aqueous potassium iodide	5 cm ³	0.2 mol/dm ³ potassium iodide	Dissolve 33 g potassium iodide, KI, in 1 dm ³ of distilled water.
[F] [MH] [HH] [N] organic liquid	2 cm ³	See notes.	Use cyclohexane [F] [MH] [HH] [N] or medicinal liquid paraffin. Supply in a stoppered tube.

[C] dilute nitric acid	10 cm ³	1.0 mol/dm ³ HNO ₃	See preparation instructions in the current syllabus. If necessary, each of these reagents can be provided as a communal supply for groups of up to 6 candidates. Invigilators must be alert to the risk of contamination and the opportunity for malpractice when using a communal supply.
[MH] dilute sulfuric acid	10 cm ³	0.5 mol/dm ³ H ₂ SO ₄	
[MH] [N] aqueous ammonia	10 cm ³	1.0 mol/dm ³ NH ₃	
[C] aqueous sodium hydroxide	10 cm ³	1.0 mol/dm ³ NaOH	
aqueous barium chloride or aqueous barium nitrate	10 cm ³	0.1 mol/dm ³ BaCl ₂ or 0.1 mol/dm ³ Ba(NO ₃) ₂	
aqueous silver nitrate	10 cm ³	0.05 mol/dm ³ AgNO ₃	
[MH] limewater	10 cm ³	saturated aqueous calcium hydroxide, Ca(OH) ₂	

- An excess of at least 10% of each material must be prepared to cover accidental loss.

- All solutions must be thoroughly mixed.

- If you are unable to source any of these chemicals, you must contact Cambridge International as far as possible in advance of the exam for advice.

- Materials must be labelled only as specified in the 'label' column. The identities of chemicals labelled with letter codes, e.g. P, may be different from their descriptions in the question paper. Candidates must use the descriptions given in the question paper.
