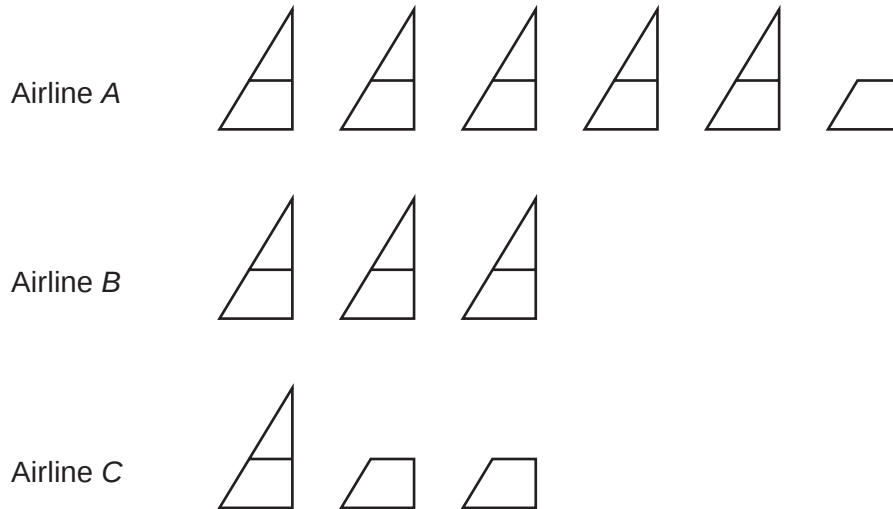

Section A [36 marks]

Answer **all** of the questions 1 to 6.

- 1** The pictogram below illustrates the numbers of aircraft operated by three airlines in 2003.



The symbol  represents 40 aircraft.

- (i)** Calculate the number of aircraft operated in 2003 by Airline *B*. [1]

The total number of aircraft operated by the three airlines is 450.
One aircraft is chosen at random from the three airlines.

- (ii)** Calculate, as a fraction in its lowest terms, the probability that the aircraft is operated by Airline *B*. [1]
- (iii)** Calculate how many aircraft the symbol  represents. [2]

Two aircraft are chosen at random from the 3 airlines.

- (iv)** Calculate the probability that one aircraft is operated by Airline *B* and one aircraft is operated by Airline *C*. [3]

- 2 In a small village there are 240 adults whose ages are classified below.

Age	Men	Women
18 – 35	35	22
36 – 60	45	63
61 or over	26	49

A committee of 20 is to be selected by stratified random sampling to represent the 240 adults.

- (i) Show that the number of men required for the committee from the 18 – 35 category is 3. [1]
- (ii) Construct a table showing the number required for the committee from each category. [2]
- (iii) One person is selected at random from the committee. Calculate the probability that the person selected is a woman from the 36 – 60 category. [1]
- (iv) One person is selected at random from the adults in the village. Calculate the probability that the person selected is a woman from the 36 – 60 category. [1]

- 3 The marks scored in a test by a group of 10 students were

20 3 8 9 6 6 8 10 6 4.

Three different measures of average can be found from the data above.

- (i) State the name of the statistical measure which is the most common mark.
Give the numerical value of this statistical measure. [2]
- (ii) State the name of the statistical measure which is the mark such that 5 of the students score less than it and 5 of the students score more than it.
Give the numerical value of this statistical measure. [2]
- (iii) State the name of the statistical measure which is calculated from the total marks of all 10 students.
Give the numerical value of this statistical measure. [2]

- 4 The table below shows the percentages in each of four age groups of male full-time students at a certain college in 2000.

<i>Age group</i>	<i>Percentage</i>
18 or under	15.2
19 – 20	35.8
21 – 24	37.8
25 or over	11.2

The data are to be illustrated by a pie chart.

- (i) Calculate, showing your method, the sector angles of the pie chart. Give your answers to the nearest degree. [2]
- (ii) Draw the pie chart using a circle of radius 5 cm. Label each sector with the appropriate age group. [2]

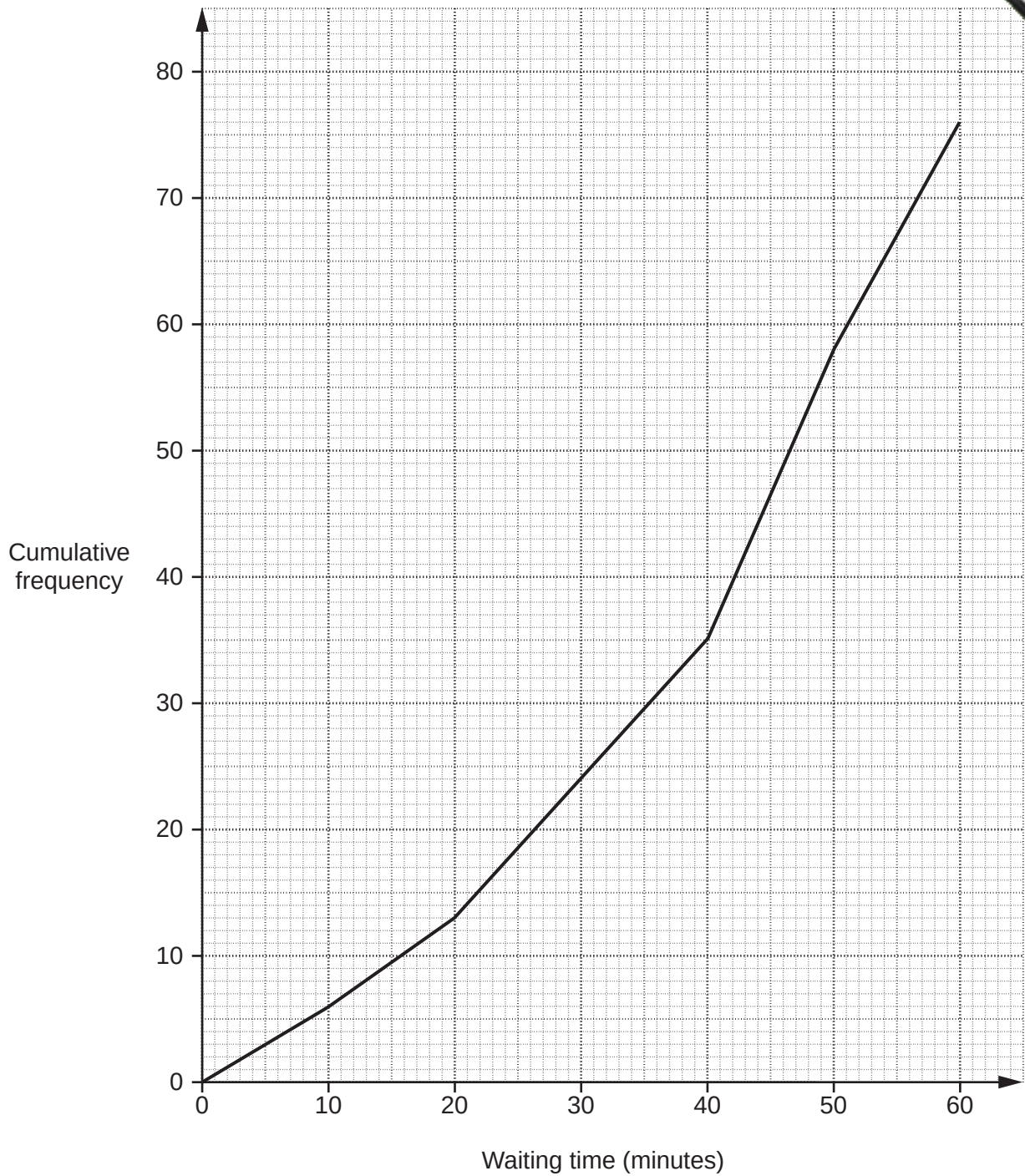
The table below shows the numbers of female full-time students in the same age groups at the same college for 1980 and also for 2000.

<i>Age group</i>	1980	2000
18 or under	42	63
19 – 20	90	158
21 – 24	54	91
25 or over	32	48

A pie chart of radius 6 cm was used to represent the numbers of female full-time students by age in 1980.

- (iii) Calculate, to 1 decimal place, the radius of a comparable pie chart to represent the numbers of female full-time students by age in 2000. [2]

- 5 The cumulative frequency polygon below shows the waiting times, in minutes, of a sample of 80 patients at a doctor's surgery in a certain town.



Use the cumulative frequency polygon to estimate

- (i) the median waiting time, to the nearest minute, [1]
- (ii) the interquartile range of the waiting times, to the nearest minute, [3]
- (iii) the percentage, to 1 decimal place, of patients waiting more than 20 minutes to see the doctor. [3]

- 6 A survey was taken of the main method of travelling to work of 1200 people who work for a company.

The table below summarizes the data for this survey.

<i>Type of travel</i>	<i>Male</i>	<i>Female</i>	<i>Total</i>
Car	180	570	750
Bus or train	45	405	450
Totals	225	975	1200

Use the table to calculate the probability that a person chosen at random

- (i) travels to work by car and is a female, [1]
- (ii) travels by car or is a female who does not travel by car, [3]
- (iii) travels by bus or train, given that the person is a male. [1]

Section B [64 marks]

Answer not more than **four** of the questions 7 to 11.

Each question in this section carries 16 marks.

- 7 (a) The table below relates to area A in 1998.

<i>Age group</i>	<i>Population</i>	<i>Number of deaths</i>	<i>Death rate per 1000</i>	<i>Standard Population</i>
0 – 21	3000	45	<i>P</i>	4000
22 – 49	2500	<i>Q</i>	8	3500
50 and over	<i>R</i>	40	20	2500

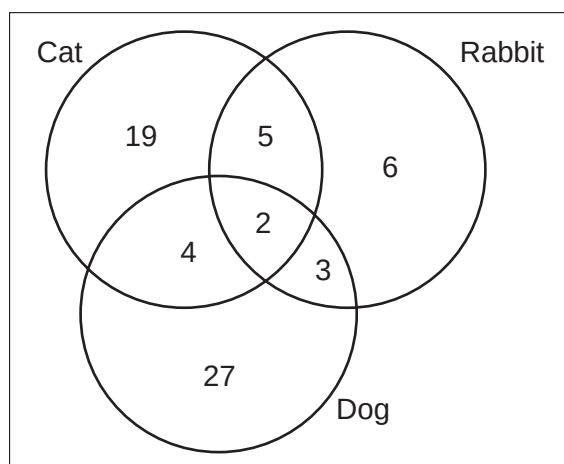
- (i) Calculate each of the numbers represented by the letters *P*, *Q* and *R*. [3]
- (ii) Calculate the crude death rate of area A. [2]
- (iii) Calculate the standardized death rate of area A. [3]

- (b) A survey of 80 households was undertaken to find out whether the household had a dog, a cat or a rabbit as a pet.

None of the households had more than one dog or more than one cat or more than one rabbit.

Some households did not have any pets.

The diagram below summarises **most** of the results of the survey.



For example, 4 households had exactly 1 cat and 1 dog but no rabbit
6 households had only a rabbit.

- (i) Copy and complete the frequency table for the number of pets per household.

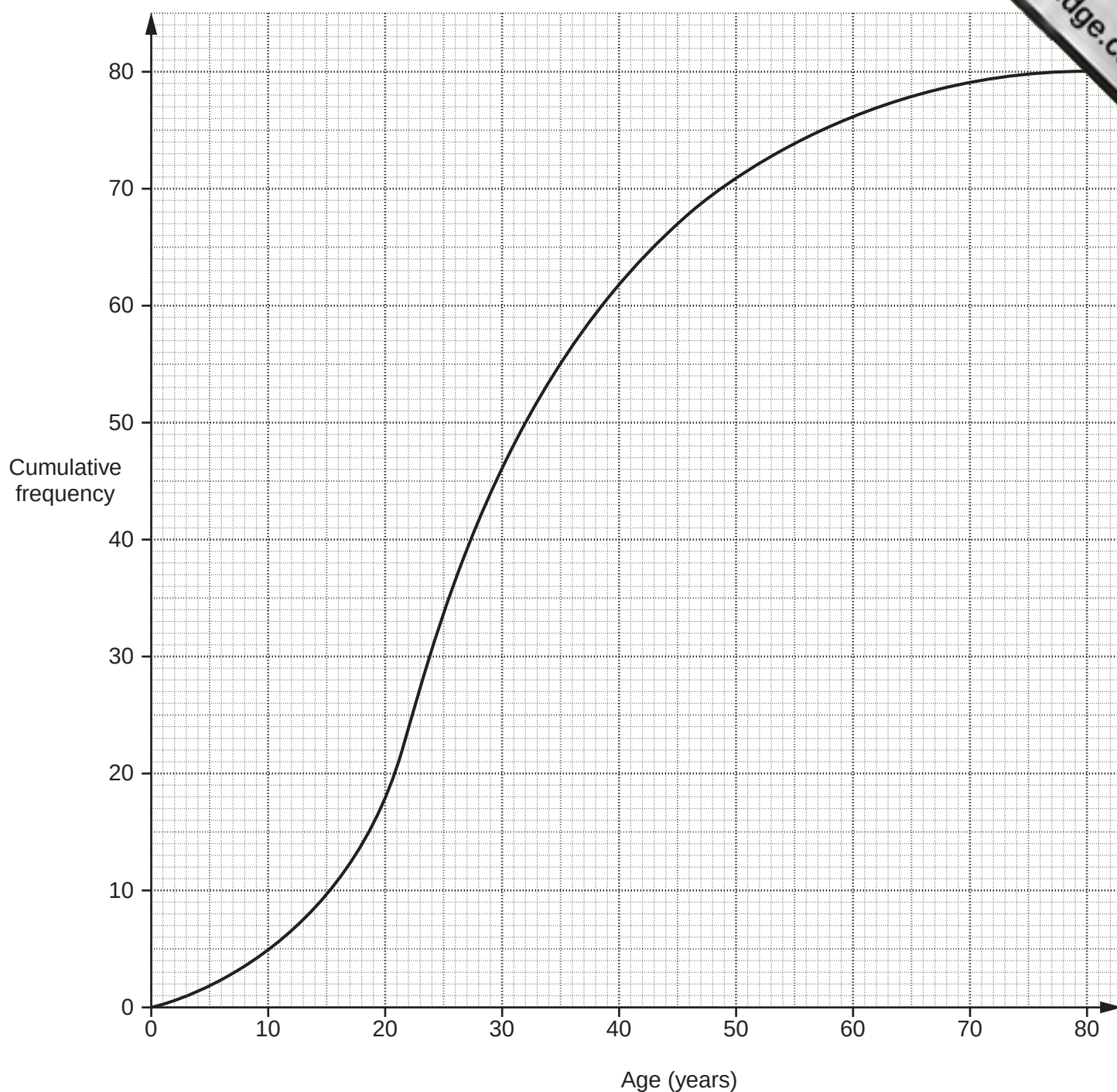

- (iv) only a dog and a rabbit. [1]

- 8 A survey was taken of the age distribution of 80 people swimming at a pool. The cumulative frequency graph below shows the age distribution of the 80 people.



- (i) Use the cumulative frequency graph to obtain an estimate of

- (ii) Use the cumulative frequency graph to estimate the number of people at the swimming pool aged 15 years or over.
- (iii) Using the cumulative frequency graph, copy and complete the frequency distribution below.

Age (y years)	Number of people
$0 \leq y < 15$	
$15 \leq y < 25$	
$25 \leq y < 50$	
$50 \leq y < 80$

A person is selected at random from the people at the swimming pool.

- (iv) Calculate the probability that this person is aged between 15 years and 25 years. [1]

Exactly 40% of the people were aged Y years or below.

- (v) Use the cumulative frequency graph to estimate the value of Y . [2]

A similar survey was taken of the age distribution of people at a garden centre. The survey showed that the median age of the people at the garden centre was 46 years and the interquartile range was 28 years.

- (vi) Compare the age distribution of the people at the garden centre with that of the people at the swimming pool. [1]

- 9 The following table shows the annual salaries of the 70 employees of a small manufacturing company.

Salary (\$x)	Number of employees
$10\,000 \leq x < 15\,000$	20
$15\,000 \leq x < 17\,000$	15
$17\,000 \leq x < 20\,000$	15
$20\,000 \leq x < 22\,000$	16
$22\,000 \leq x < 23\,000$	4

- (i) State the median salary of the employees. [1]
- (ii) Using 2 cm to represent \$2000 on the horizontal axis, starting at \$10 000, and a column of height 10 cm to represent the $17\,000 \leq x < 20\,000$ salary group, draw on graph paper a histogram to illustrate the distribution of the salaries of the employees. [5]
- (iii) Use your histogram to identify the modal class for this distribution. [1]
- (iv) Write down the mid-values of the five groups of salaries. [2]
- (v) Calculate, to the nearest \$50, an estimate of the mean salary of the employees. [2]
- (vi) Calculate, to the nearest \$50, an estimate of the standard deviation of the salaries of the employees. [3]
- (vii) If you were the owner of the manufacturing company, which statistical measure of the average salary would you use? Give a reason for your answer. [2]

- 10 The prices in cents of eight items of food purchased from the same shop on 1st August 2000 and 1st August 2001 are given below.

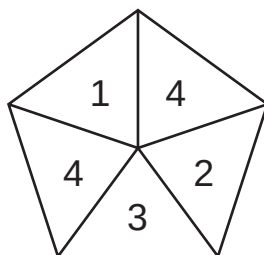
<i>Item</i>	<i>Price 1st August 2000 (x)</i>	<i>Price 1st August 2001 (y)</i>
<i>A</i>	104	108
<i>B</i>	60	66
<i>C</i>	128	144
<i>D</i>	84	88
<i>E</i>	140	148
<i>F</i>	36	42
<i>G</i>	52	54
<i>H</i>	28	30

- (i) Using 2 cm to represent 20 cents on each axis, plot on graph paper a scatter diagram of the price on 1st August 2001 (y) against the price on 1st August 2000 (x). [3]
- (ii) By calculating and plotting $(\bar{x}, \bar{y})$ and the two semi-averages, draw the line of best fit. [6]
- (iii) Using your graph, state the item which had a greater proportionate price increase than the other seven items between 1st August 2000 and 1st August 2001. [1]

The prices of two other items, K and L , increased similarly to the items in the table.

- (iv) Use your graph to estimate the price of item K on 1st August 2001 if its price on 1st August 2000 was 72 cents. [1]
- (v) Use your graph to estimate the price of item L on 1st August 2000 if its price on 1st August 2001 was 96 cents. [1]
- (vi) Obtain the equation of your line of best fit in the form $y = mx + c$. [3]
- (vii) Give an interpretation for the value of m in your equation. [1]

- 11 (a) The diagram below shows a spinner. The probability that the spinner lands on a shaded sector is the same as the probability that the spinner lands on an unshaded sector. The probability that the spinner lands on a shaded outside edge is the same.



The spinner is used three times. Calculate the probability of getting

- (i) a 4 on the first spin only, [3]
- (ii) a 4 on exactly two of the spins. [3]
- (b) Bag A contains 3 red discs and 4 blue discs. Bag B contains 2 red discs and 5 blue discs.
- Hanif takes a disc at random from Bag A and puts it into Bag B.
Ruth **then** takes a disc at random from Bag B and puts it into Bag A.
- Calculate the probability that Bag A now contains 3 red discs. [5]
- (c) In a certain basketball competition all games are either won or lost.
- If a team wins a game then the probability that the team wins its next game is $\frac{3}{4}$.
- If a team loses a game then the probability of the team losing the next game is $\frac{5}{8}$.
- Assuming that a team won their last game, calculate the probability that the team wins exactly one game from its next three games. [5]
