Source

The Northern Ireland Executive was regularly in a state of crisis because of its internal divisions. The lack of collective responsibility among members of the Executive was one clear indication of this. Members of the Executive were only too willing to publicly disagree with one another. However, the Executive survived and Unionists and Nationalists governed together until January 2017. Sharing power sometimes took a symbolic form, such as the First and Deputy First Ministers appearing jointly. There were also examples of practical power-sharing that did not catch the headlines.

- 1 Identify **two** types of committee within the Northern Ireland Assembly between 2007 and 2017. [4]

- 2 With reference to the Source and any other relevant material you have studied, explain what is meant by “collective responsibility”. [6]

- 3 With reference to the Source and any other relevant material you have studied, explain **three** ways in which the Executive shared power between 2007 and 2017. [15]

- 4 (a) Assess the view that the current policies of the DUP are totally different from those it supported in 1998. [25]

- (b) Assess the reasons why Sinn Féin has succeeded in replacing the SDLP as the dominant Nationalist party. [25]
