Section A

Answer **one** question from Section A

- 1 (a) Explain the Ontological argument for the existence of God with reference to any **two** thinkers you have studied. [35]
- (b) Comment on the claim that the only weakness of the Ontological argument is that “existence” is not a real predicate. Justify your answer. [15]
- 2 (a) Explain the contribution of Martin Buber to mysticism. [35]
- (b) Explore the view that mysticism may help unify believers. Justify your answer. [15]

- 3 (a) Give an account of the origins of evil and explain why evil is a problem for the religious believer. [35]
- (b) With reference to other aspects of human experience, explore the view that suffering is both necessary and rewarding. Justify your answer. [15]
- 4 (a) “Miracles are merely the product of superstitious thinking and can no longer be taken seriously.”
- With reference to this claim, describe atheism’s rejection of miracles. [35]
- (b) With reference to other aspects of human experience, comment on the claim that denying God’s interventions leaves the world without hope. Justify your answer. [15]
