SOURCE A

Immigration in Northern Ireland

There are at least 18 ethnic minority groups living in Northern Ireland. There are also around 2000 refugees mainly from China, Iraq, Sierra Leone and Somalia. They have left their homeland for fear of persecution, perhaps because of their religion, nationality, their social group or as a result of conflict, famine or natural disasters.

Immigration has led to our society becoming more culturally diverse. Ethnic minority groups enjoy celebrating their culture by holding community events and festivals. This gives local people an opportunity to find out more about their language, dress, diet/food, sport, etc.

However, not everyone in Northern Ireland welcomes immigrants or refugees and in recent years there has been an increase in hate crime and racial incidents reported to the police.
