SOURCE A

Risk Taking Behaviour

Whilst most young people are responsible for their behaviour the media often portray young people as taking risks that may damage their health such as smoking, abusing alcohol or taking drugs.

The media have also reported young people taking risks that may put themselves or others in danger such as causing trouble in the local community through crime and anti-social behaviour, e.g. stealing cars, vandalism, drinking in the street, “yobbish behaviour” or fighting. Consequences may include an overdose, car accident or knife attacks which may lead to an unfortunate and early death.

Some common reasons young people give for risk taking:

- peer group pressure
- impressing friends and wanting to be accepted
- going along with the crowd and not wanting to be left out
- don't feel they can say no or speak up when they are in a risky situation
- attention seeking
- boredom
- influence of alcohol or drugs.
