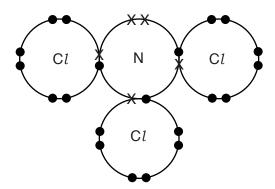

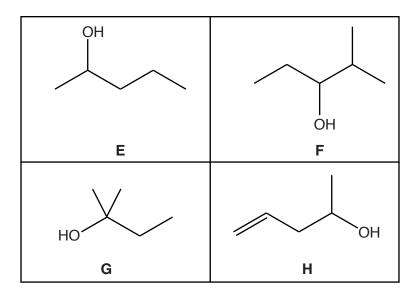

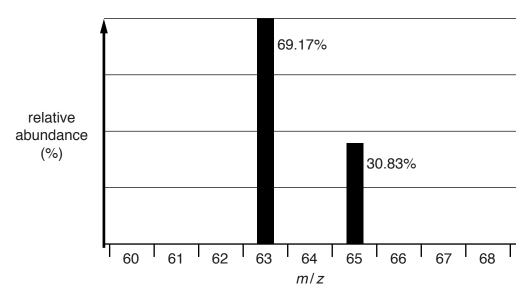

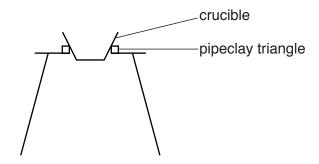

24 Aqueous lead(II) nitrate, Pb(NO₃)₂(aq), and aqueous potassium iodide, KI(aq), react together. The equation is shown below.

$$Pb(NO_3)_2(aq) + 2KI(aq) \rightarrow PbI_2(s) + 2KNO_3(aq)$$

A student carries out an experiment to determine the enthalpy change of reaction, $\Delta_r H$, of this reaction.

The student follows the method outlined below.

- Add $50.0\,\mathrm{cm^3}$ of $1.50\,\mathrm{mol\,dm^{-3}}$ Pb(NO₃)₂(aq) to a polystyrene cup. Measure out $50.0\,\mathrm{cm^3}$ of a solution of KI(aq), which is in excess.
- Measure the temperature of both solutions.
- Add the KI(aq) to the polystyrene cup, stir the mixture and record the maximum temperature.

 SO_3 is produced by reacting sulfur dioxide, SO_2 , and oxygen, O_2 , as shown in **equilibrium 25.1** below.

 - Using le Chatelier's principle, show that a low temperature and a high pressure should be used to obtain a maximum **equilibrium** yield of SO₃.

•	Explain why the actual conditions used in industry may be different from the condition needed for a maximum equilibrium yield.

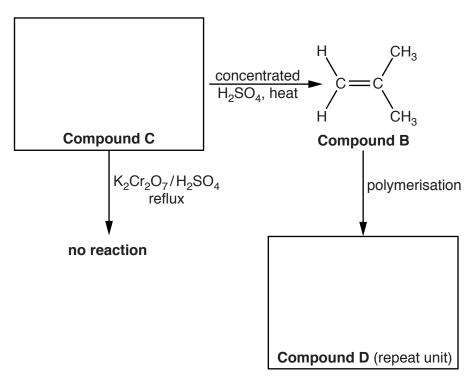

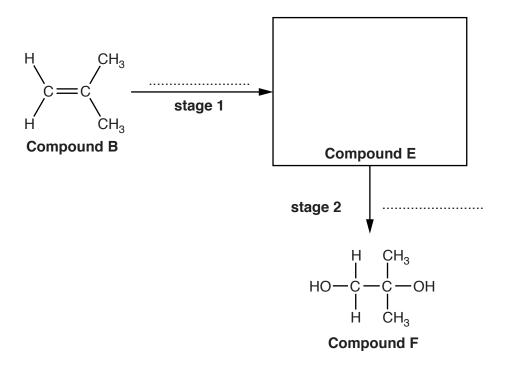
