- 3 To what extent is political power too concentrated in the UK? [50]
- 4 Evaluate how well rights in the UK are protected both in theory and in practice. [50]
- 5 To what extent do ideological views of human nature affect policies on law and order? [50]
- 6 Discuss the view that the modern UK Conservative Party is more liberal than conservative. [50]
- 7 To what extent is the modern UK Labour Party social democratic? [50]
- 8 Discuss the view that ideology is dead in the UK. [50]
