### Source for Question 1

Mao Tse Tung stated, 'Political power grows out of the barrel of a gun.' This suggests that power, in a political sense, can be linked to force, and therefore requires governments to exercise military as well as law-making powers. Political theorists have debated the legitimacy of the use of power, with many differentiating power from authority. Within a liberal democracy, there is a tendency to focus upon power in relation to decision-making, but Steven Lukes argues that there are other forms of power as well, most notably agenda-setting and thought control.

 (b) Compare and contrast decision-making with agenda-setting as a form of political power. [15]
