- 1 Discuss the view that voters are increasingly volatile today. [50]
- 2 To what extent are parties in decline while pressure groups flourish? [50]
- 3 Discuss the factors that influence the type of party system to be found in a country. [50]
- 4 To what extent are rights effectively protected in political systems today? [50]
- 5 'A parliamentary system is more likely than a presidential system to lead to an elective dictatorship.' Discuss. [50]
- 6 'Crises are the most important factor in determining the power of chief executives.' Discuss. [50]
- 7 Discuss the view that judges are 'politicians in robes'. [50]
- 8 'Political systems do not need a second legislative chamber.' Discuss. [50]
