They have captured the [hearts of the nation](#) and made history with television viewing figures, but their coach has said there will be no heroes' welcome when the Lionesses come home today because his players do not deserve one.

"They don't want it; they've not earned it," Phil Neville said. "They feel probably embarrassed to be celebrating fourth place . . . A bus-top tour or a trip to Downing Street would be celebrating failure."
