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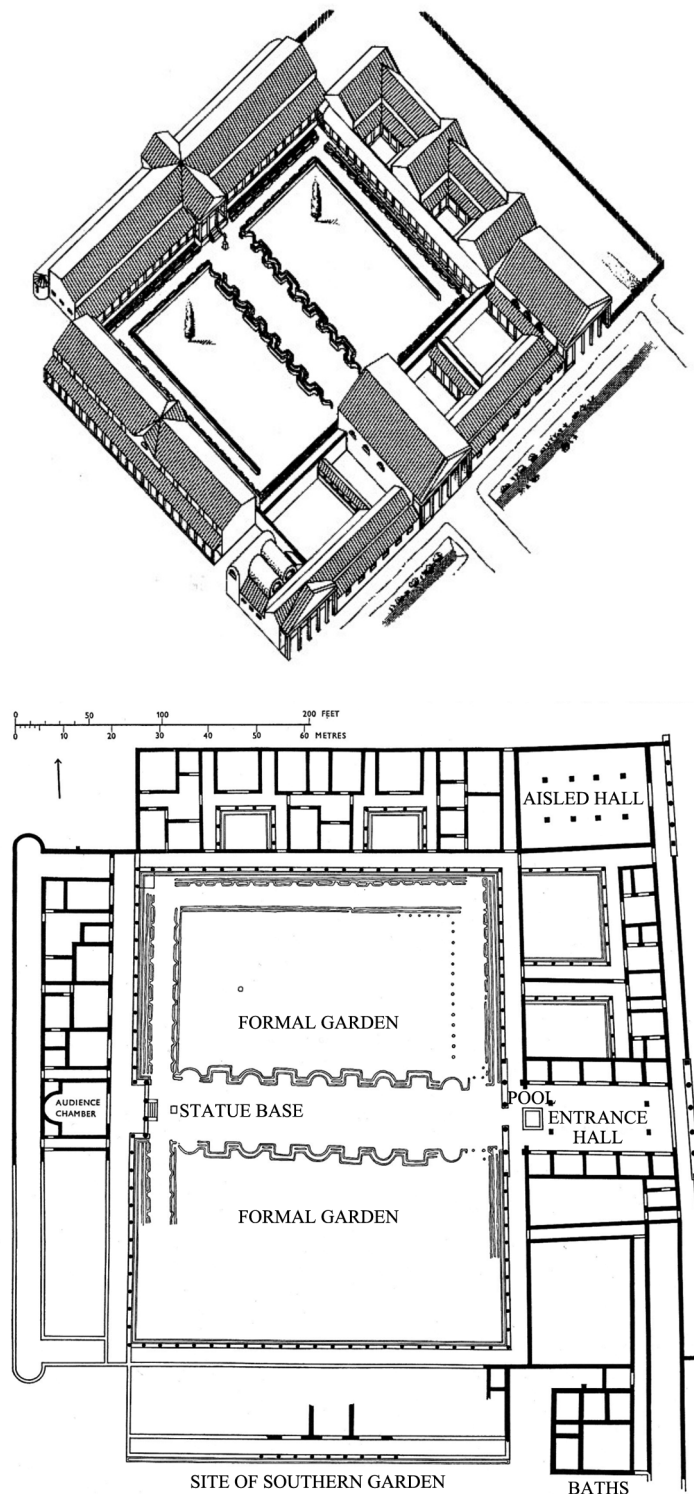

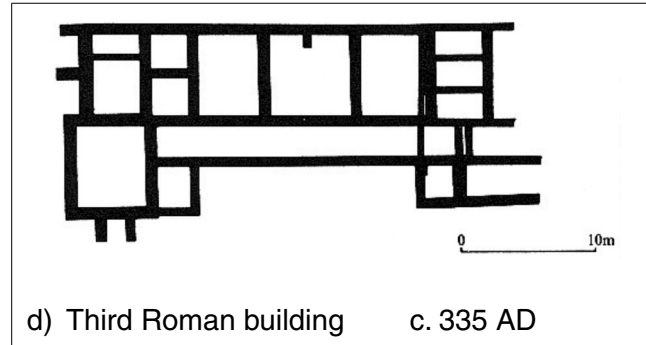

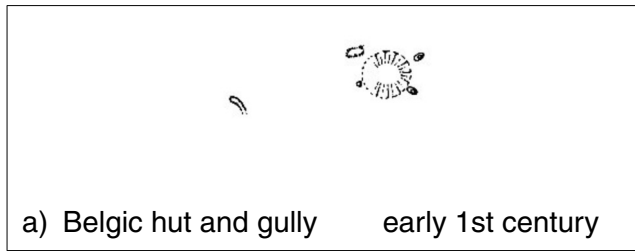

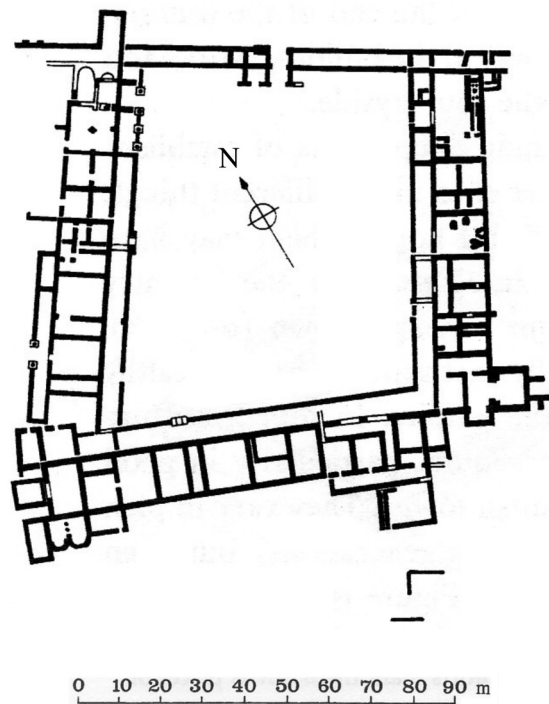
- 1 Study the diagrams and answer the questions.

- (a) With reference to these diagrams, explain how useful these villas are in helping us to understand how villas developed in Roman Britain. [25]
- (b) 'The villas in Britain are proof that the way of life for native Britons had changed completely by the end of the period of Roman rule.' How far do you agree with this view? [25]

2 Study the inscriptions and answer the questions.

Sacred to Brigantia: Amandus, engineer, by command fulfilled the order.

*Birrens (Blatobulgium), Dumfriesshire. Statue of the goddess Brigantia.
Mid 2nd or possibly early 3rd century.*

Iulius Vitalis, armourer of the Twentieth Legion Valeria Victrix, of 9 years' service, aged 29, by origin a Belga, with funeral at the cost of the guild of armourers. Here he lies.

*Bath (Aquae Sulis). Tombstone found near the Fosse Way.
Date uncertain – possibly 3rd century AD.*

To the African, Italian and Gallic Mother Goddesses, Marcus Minucius Audens, soldier of the Sixth Legion Victrix, pilot in the Sixth Legion, willingly, gladly and deservedly fulfilled his vow.

An altar found in Micklegate, opposite Holy Trinity Church, York. ? Severan (early 3rd century).

To the spirits of the departed (and) to Anicius Ingenuus, *medicus ordinarius* of the First Tungrian Cohort: he lived 25 years. (*Medicus ordinarius* is most probably a doctor with the rank equivalent to that of a centurion.)

Housesteads. 3rd century AD.

To Neptune and the Genius of the place and the Spirits of the Emperors, Lucius Viducius Placidus, the son of Viducius, from the Vellocasses in the province of Lugdunensis, trader with Britain, presented the arch and gate on behalf of himself and his descendants in the consulship of Gratus and Seleucus.

York (Eboracum). AD 221.

- (a) How useful are these inscriptions in showing how the Roman army helped the development of the economy of Britain during the occupation? [25]
- (b) How far does other evidence support the view that the economy of Britain flourished during the Roman occupation? [25]
