Explain how his argument is **both** strengthened **and** weakened by **expertise**. [6]

- 2 (a) 'Whatever money you're spending on luxuries, not necessities, should be given away.'
(Document 1 paragraph 6)

Briefly explain how this claim is weakened by **two** problems of definition of the word 'necessities'. [4]

- (b) 'The poor are more generous than the rich. The bottom fifth of society give 3% of their income whereas the top fifth give just 1%.' (Document 5 paragraph 1)

Briefly explain how the support for the claim in the first sentence is weakened by **one** problem of definition of the word 'generous'. [2]

- 3 Evaluate any **one** possible choice which individuals can make about giving or not giving to relieve **world poverty**, such as giving 10% of their income to charity, including but not restricted to the relief of world poverty.

You may use this example or any choice of your own.

You should use **three** appropriate criteria (such as fairness) for your evaluation. [12]

- 4 Write an argument to support any **one** possible choice which individuals may make about giving or not giving to relieve **world poverty**.

In your argument you should use some relevant **principles** and explain why you have rejected at least one **alternative** choice. Support your argument by referring critically to material from the resource booklet. [36]
