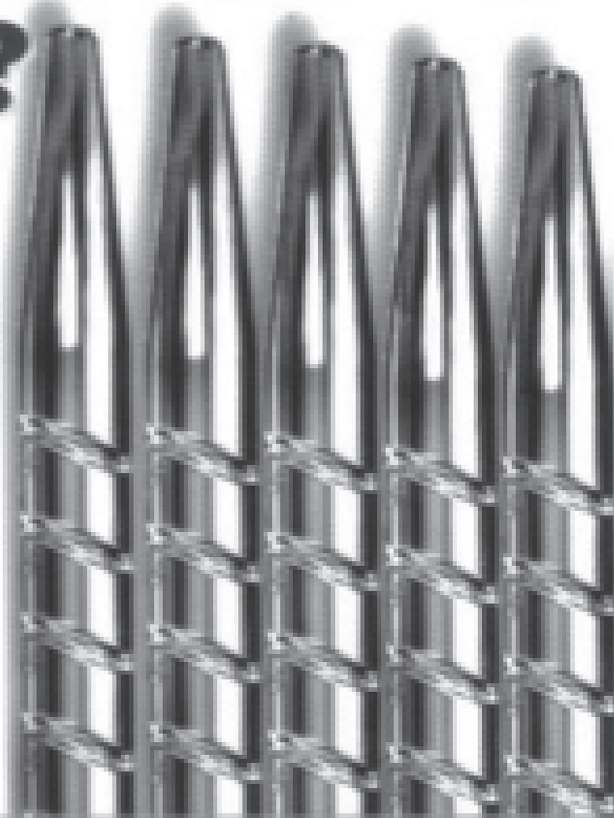

TEXT B is a transcription of a farewell speech by Sir Alex Ferguson, the former manager of Manchester United Football Club, delivered to a packed stadium in May 2013 and widely televised. Ferguson's Scottish accent has been represented by phonetic spelling in places.

I have been very fortunate (2) I have been able to manage some of the greatest players in the country (.) let alone Manchester United (2) and all these players here today have represented our club the proper way (1) they won a championship in a (.) fantastic fashion (.) well done to the players (*longer pause, applause from crowd*) my retirement doesn't mean the end of my life with the club (1) I'll be able to now enjoy watchin' 'em rather than suffer with them (*laughter from crowd*) but if you think about it (.) those last minute goals (.) the comebacks (.) even the defeats are all part of this great football club of ours (1) and it has been an unbelievable experience for all of us (.) so thank you for that (*applause from crowd*) I'd also (.) I'd also like to remind you (.) that (.) when we had bad times here (.) the club stood by me (2) all ma staff stood by me (.) the players stood by me (.) your job now (1) is to stand by our new manager (*longer pause, applause from crowd and chanting*) tha' is important (*longer pause, applause from crowd and chanting*) I'd just (.) before I before I start bubbling (.) I just want to pay tribute to Paul Scholes who retires today (*cheering*) he's er (.) unbelievable (.) one of the greatest players this club has ever had or ever will have (.) Paul (.) we wish you a good retirement (1) I know you will be around to annoy me (1) but eh also I would like to just say a little word wishin' Darren Fletcher¹ a speedy re- comeback to our club (*longer pause, applause from crowd*) the players (.) I wish the players every success in future (1) you know how good y'are (.) you know the jersey you're wearin' (.) you know what it means to everyone here (.) and don't ever let yourselves down (1) the expectation is always there so (.) I'm goin' home (.) well I'm goin' inside for a while (1) I just want to say thank you once again from all from all the Ferguson family (.) they're all up there (1) eleven grandchildren (*waves*) thank you (.) thank you

TEXT C

TEXT C is an extract from the last part of 'I Am The Secret Footballer', a book by a Premier League footballer who keeps his identity a secret. It was published in 2012.

As I write, British football is still digesting the news that Alex Ferguson is retiring as manager of Manchester United. As one wit put it on Twitter: "Sir Alex Ferguson. 26 years. 13 Premier League titles. 10 Community Shields. 5 FA Cups. 4 League Cups. 2 European Cups. 1 piece of chewing gum..."

What about me, though? I'm still playing for a living – but more and more I feel I'm doing it on borrowed time.

I can't help thinking about that day in March 2012 when Bolton's Fabrice Muamba collapsed on the pitch at White Hart Lane². I have to admit that I thought he was dead. I think most people did.

I had a lot of friends at that match, for one reason or another, and they told me that the atmosphere inside the ground was unlike anything they'd ever witnessed before. It was like watching the disintegration of a space shuttle just after its launch. There was a sense of helplessness and disbelief.

It was an awful moment. But, in these moments, people show what they are made of. The paramedics who saved Muamba's life certainly did, as did the hospital staff, the fans, the football community as a whole and, most importantly, Fabrice. He has been forced to retire, but a far greater tragedy was averted. We have been left to reflect on a remarkable story that showed off football as a sport that, despite its obvious flaws, can unite people in testing times.

But that isn't the reason I decided to carry on playing. As team-mates, family and friends never seem to tire of telling me, you're a long time retired. That certainly rings true if you happen to be one of those players that has nothing else to live for besides football, but I've never been that man. I love the game but, like Fabrice, I'm looking forward to having my life back.
