- 3 Consider whether or not a court is likely to find the contracts below frustrated and, if so, what the legal consequences would be.

- (a) Last week Alberto contracted Bryony to collect and hand-deliver his film script from his house in Newcastle to a production company in London. Bryony knew it would cost her £70 in flights and other costs to complete the journey and so she charged Alberto £150. The delivery is to be made tomorrow but this morning a volcano erupted and the ash cloud has halted all flights for the next three days. Bryony will now have to drive to Newcastle and then London which will take much longer and will cost her almost £200. She would like to pull out of the deal. [10]
- (b) Karim has a contract to produce 1000 footballs for Lauren at a cost of £2 each. Of the total cost (£2000), half is to be paid on delivery of the first 500 footballs and the final half is to be paid on completion. Karim has so far produced and delivered 750 footballs but he has not received any payment. Yesterday his factory burnt down destroying the machinery he needs to produce the footballs. [10]
- (c) Seetha wants Vlad to create for her a diamond necklace made of 50 pink diamonds. Vlad knows that there are only about 70 pink diamonds available and that they are highly sought after but he nevertheless agrees and they sign a contract. The cost is £50 000, to be paid in full on delivery of the necklace. Vlad has only been able to purchase 40 pink diamonds, at a cost to him of £20 000. The other diamonds have been bought by other collectors who now don't want to sell them. This morning, Parliament made the trade in pink diamonds illegal. [10]
