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4	<p>(b)</p> <p>One mark for suitable drawback, two marks for explanation: e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Drawback of an online calendar is that if the internet connection goes down (1) it can't be worked on by all (1) and changes will be lost or have to be revised. (1). 	3	<p>Suggestion of drawback must be based on one of the correct suggestions made in 4a)</p> <p>If the suggestion is not correct in 4a), 4b) will get 0 marks.</p> <p>Answer has to reference a drawback of the method, not a problem with planning or project management.</p>
5	<p>Level 3 (6-8 marks)</p> <p>There is an excellent discussion of a primary research method that Shaista could use to get feedback. There will be a thorough comparison against another method and differences will be explained fully.</p> <p>Level 2 (3-5 marks)</p> <p>There is a good discussion of a primary research method that Shaista could use to get feedback. There will be some comparison against another method and differences will be sometimes explained.</p> <p>Level 1 (1-2 marks)</p> <p>There is a basic discussion of a primary research method that Shaista could use to get feedback. The brief may not be mentioned. There will be limited comparison against another method.</p> <p>0 marks for responses not worthy of credit</p>	8	<p>Read answer as a whole and then award marks.</p> <p>Points that may be covered:</p> <p>Shaista might use:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Focus group to gain feedback from one particular cultural or year group. Interviews with the lecturers to gain feedback on whether the written content fully covers what is necessary in terms of information about the courses on offer. <p>It might be compared against:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Online survey that can be distributed more widely to gain more feedback but this may not be as focused or targeted. <p>If they use two types of the same method (e.g. online questionnaire v. face to face questionnaire) then limit to Level 2.</p> <p>If the brief is not mentioned or addressed then limit to Level 2.</p>

6	<p>One mark for each idea for content, two marks for expansion: e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Ask the expert feature (1) which could be with a lecturer or an older student (1) and would be available via chat or forum function (1).	9	<p>Ideas for content should be based on the brief and show originality and demonstrate understanding of website functionality (e.g. uploading of images).</p> <p>Do not award marks for advertising/sponsorship ideas – answer should be about the content for the website to show engagement with the brief.</p>

Uses and elements of a SWOT analysis are appropriate and sometimes justified.</p> <p>There will be some errors of spelling, punctuation and grammar but these are unlikely to be intrusive or obscure meaning.</p> <p>Level 2 - 5-8 marks</p> <p>A basic evaluation about the effective use of producing a SWOT analysis as part of the planning process for the website. Uses and elements of a SWOT analysis are mostly appropriate and linked to the context.</p> <p>There are likely to be some errors of spelling, punctuation and grammar of which some may be noticeable and intrusive.</p> <p>Level 1 - 1-4 marks</p> <p>Limited understanding of the use of a SWOT analysis is demonstrated.</p> <p>The examples used are sometimes appropriate and may be general and not linked to the context</p> <p>0 – no response or no response worthy of credit.</p>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Is not useful for all involved in production process such as communication different design ideas to all involved. • Cannot be used for the planning of personnel. • Cannot be used effectively to manage a project and timescales. <p>Candidates can only reach Top of Level 3 if they have not discussed other pre-production documents in the context that a SWOT analysis cannot be used to plan the whole project.</p>

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
