	(b)	<p>ONE mark for the potential problem and TWO marks for suitable expansion e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A potential problem of a link to a survey to 12-17 year olds on Twitter is that they might ignore it (1). To minimise this problem Flashbang Productions could get a celebrity to endorse the research, such as Zoella, (1) that appeals to the target market as a trusted source (1). Target audience focus groups will provide lots of open information (1) which takes time to analyse (1), could minimise this by structuring questions with options. (1) Any other valid response 	3	<p>Any form of problem linking to research methods and collecting data should be rewarded.</p> <p>Does not need to refer to 2 (a)</p>

A problem with this is that the music may be licenced to an artist under copyright (1) but the licence holder may not be identified at the source (1). • Copyright frees music website (1) however the music may not be that good (1) so it may not appeal to the target audience (1) • Any other valid response 	3	Answers should consider a way that music can be sourced and potential problems of this.
6	(b)	<p>ONE mark for a correct way that the production team could avoid problems. TWO marks for explanation that references research.</p> <p>e.g.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Flashbang Productions could hire a Production Music Writer to compose original tracks (1). This way any music the writer creates for 'Life in Between' will be owned by the production company (1) because the writer has signed a clause that all music produced for the show is owned by the company. This information found on www.careersinmusic.com (1) • Flashbang could source music from exclusive TV production library, such as www.audionetwork.com (1). The songs in the library are easy to listen to and access and all royalties are paid to the original artist through the library website (1). This means that all 	6	Answers should show the candidate understands how music can be sourced for use in television without breaking copyright law. Answers must reference research for the third mark.

9*	<p>Level 4 12-15 marks</p> <p>An excellent discussion of four methods to gain feedback is on the pilot episode is demonstrated. The methods suggested to ensure the feedback shows the content is suitable for the audience are wholly appropriate and justified and research has been fully considered. Sentences and paragraphs, consistently relevant, have been well structured, using appropriate technical terminology. There may be few, if any, errors of spelling, punctuation and grammar.</p>	15	<p>A candidate can only gain a level 4 if four methods have been assessed in relation to target audience of the programme.</p> <p>Equally a candidate <u>cannot get level 3</u> even with good examples of gaining feedback on the pilot <u>if only two areas have been assessed</u>.</p> <p>However, a best fit approach should be applied to level 1 and level 2 answers with credit to candidates given based on the quality of their ideas for methods of gaining feedback.</p>

	<p>Level 3 8-11 marks</p> <p>A good understanding of at least three methods of gaining feedback is demonstrated. The methods suggested to ensure the feedback shows the content is suitable for the audience are appropriate and sometimes justified and research has been considered. There will be some errors of spelling, punctuation and grammar but these are unlikely to be intrusive or obscure meaning.</p> <p>Level 2 4-7 marks</p> <p>A basic understanding of at least two methods of gaining feedback is demonstrated. The methods suggested to ensure the feedback shows the content is suitable for the audience are only partly appropriate. There are likely to be some errors of spelling, punctuation and grammar of which some may be noticeable and intrusive.</p> <p>Level 1 1-3 marks</p> <p>A limited understanding of methods is demonstrated. Few, if any, of the methods suggested may not be appropriate. There will be some errors of spelling, punctuation and grammar of which some may be noticeable and intrusive.</p>		<p>All answers must reference the research they have undertaken. Some answers may reference methods of gaining feedback on real launches to expand and explain ideas.</p> <p>Answers may include methods such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Social media test videos • Focus groups/screen tests at a local cinema at the weekend • Online polls based short YouTube videos
